At other times they simply wanted to support themselves and their families. Hopes and wishes also motivated people to move from east to west within North America. Many people from the east coast, in states such as New York and Virginia, went west to California, hoping to become rich in the California Gold Rush of 1848–1849. Later, people moved west in search of gold in Alaska. People sometimes have moved simply hoping to acquire more farmland for their family.
